Meeting Minutes: OCTOBER 10, 2001

Steve Cross called the meeting to order at 6:59 P.M.

Secretary's Report: Minutes were accepted as published in last month's Flight Lines.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented.

Field Report: George Cooper read the Field Report as presented on page three. He further noted that thanks are due to Ken Brock for helping work on the tractors.

Safety Report: Bob Rolf, the 2002 Safety Chairman was not present. The following safety issues were addressed;

* Do not take off of the taxi way!

* Do not fly helicopters except in the designated Hover Area, or over the runway and flying field, using the same guidelines as fixed-wing aircraft!

* If you witness someone doing something unsafe, diplomatically tell them that there is a problem, and ask them to avoid doing it. If the problem persists, report the matter to the Safety Officer.

* When retrieving a plane from the runway, clear the runway as soon as possible to avoid interfering with other flyers.

Activities Report: Bob Fiely will act as C.D. for the October 19, Four-Star 40 races. Some new racers are expected to compete.

OLD BUSINESS:

Silver Swallows Air Show: The Silver Swallows expressed their appreciation by giving commemorative wine glasses to all participants, a certificate of appreciation plus a substantial donation to the Spirits Club. We have also been invited to participate again next year.

NEW BUSINESS:

October Field Report

The asphalt was sealed on schedule on September 17, but the rain came about noon and the sixty percent they had done got all washed off. They returned the next day and did the whole job over and it came out very good. They said this should last us at least five years, maybe longer, with the light traffic we have on it.

Don't forget to use a catch bottle when fueling, and wipe up oil spills. The sealant is impervious to most everything, but let's keep it looking good as long as possible.

During the open house we parked two rows of cars on the grass, from the parking lot, to Amrein Road. It was dry enough and, with the rain, later recovered nicely. There is no visible damage.

Harold Mantz and I cultivated and seeded the pit area and some of the infield area the week after

Open House. We used fifty pounds of seed that was left from last springs seeding. The area is not blocked off, but has a ribbon down the center and signs saying "If you want grass, keep off". Some guys just ignore them and walk there anyway, others are trying to stay off as much as possible. It is up to you if you want to give the new grass a chance.

Scheduled mowing will end Oct. 12. We missed mowing last week due to rain and soft ground. The grass is having a good growth, with the cool weather, and may continue to need mowing, possibly until Thanksgiving. I will get some teams together to complete the season as required. Your cooperation will be appreciated.

One last note: **SMOKERS!** We turned up LOTS of cigarette filters during the seeding. If you smoke, dispose of your butts properly.

Those filters do not deteriorate and will make the area look like a men's urinal. Don't just throw them toward the container, put them in it.

The area in front of the pilots' station also has filters littering the ground. If you bring them in, YOU dispose of them properly.
